MADISON – On Monday, May 8, we recognize 'A Day without Child Care' to highlight the significant role of child care providers in our communities and for our economy. Earlier this year, Senator Agard and Representative Neubauer spearheaded a statewide campaign to gather support for fully funding the Child Care Counts program in the 2023-25 state budget. open, recruit and retain qualified staff, and provide care to over 113,000 children statewide.

Senator Agard (D-Madison) and Representative Neubauer (D-Racine) released the following statement:



"We know how critical Child Care Counts funding is to providers, families, businesses, and the overall well-being of our economy. Child care providers are the backbone to Wisconsin's workforce, and the people of Wisconsin agree. With over 3,100 people signing the Child Care Counts petition, there is no doubt that the child care industry has widespread support from a coalition of diverse individuals throughout the state.

"We are calling on the Republican-controlled Joint Finance Committee (JFC) to maintain Governor Evers' \$340 million investment proposal in the Child Care Counts program. If Child Care Counts funding is not approved, there will be catastrophic ramifications for working families. We know that in absence of its approval in the state budget, 25% of Wisconsin providers said that they would close permanently, 60% of providers indicated they would have to raise tuition, and others said they would have to cut wages for already underpaid workers.

"Democrats are working for Wisconsin, and we know that access to affordable, quality childcare is critical for the well-being of working families."
