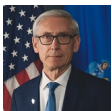

The grant program is funded by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and has the potential to help approximately 84,000 Wisconsin small businesses.

I announced in March that we are using \$2.5 billion of the \$3.2 billion the state will receive of American Rescue Plan funding to support our state's economic recovery, with \$600 million going to our small businesses.
